SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

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Keystone  Poll

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Methodology

The survey findings presented in this release are based on the results of interviews conducted between August 24 and September 2, 2007 with 585 adult Pennsylvanians, 479 of whom are registered to vote. The interviews were conducted at the Center for Opinion Research at Franklin & Marshall College under the direction of the Poll’s Director, G. Terry Madonna, the Poll’s Head Methodologist, Berwood Yost, and the Poll’s Project Manager, Jennifer Harding. Telephone numbers for the survey were generated via random digit dialing, and respondents were randomly selected from within each household. The sample error is +/- 4.1 percent for the total sample and +/- 4.5 percent for registered voters. Sample error for the primary and presidential election match-ups is higher. Final survey results were weighted to adjust for different selection probabilities and non-response.

This Keystone Poll was done in conjunction with the Harrisburg Patriot-News, Pittsburgh Tribune Review, Philadelphia Daily News, WGAL, and WTAE.

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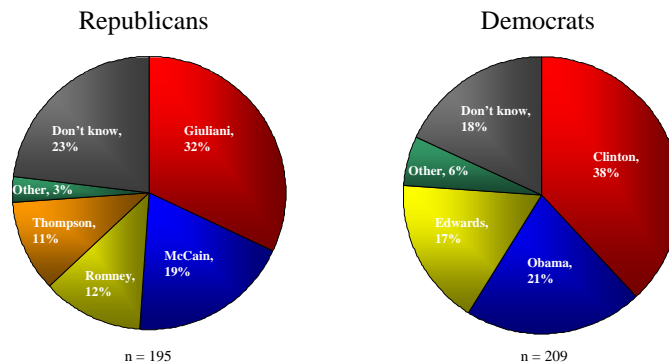
Key Findings

The latest Keystone Poll shows Rudy Giuliani leading in the race for the Republican presidential nomination in Pennsylvania over John McCain, 32 percent to 19 percent among registered Republicans (see Figure 1). Mitt Romney is a distant third at 12 percent, and Fred Thompson, whose official candidacy announcement is imminent, stands at 11 percent. Almost one in four (23%) Republicans remains undecided.

Among Democrats, Hillary Clinton leads her closest rival, Barack Obama, 38 percent to 21 percent. Clinton has a commanding lead among females, while Obama tends to draw support from younger residents.

Figure 1. 2008 Primary Election Vote Choice

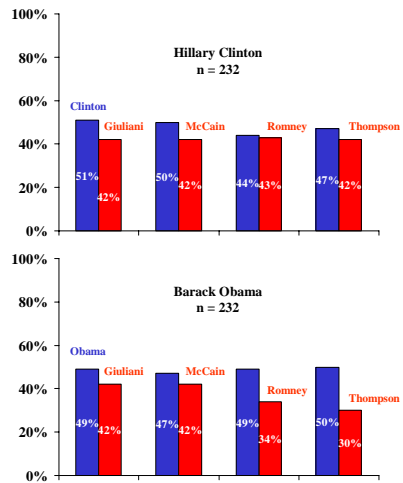

Clinton and Obama lead every Republican candidate in head-to-head match-ups (see Figure 2). Survey respondents were randomly split into two groups for questions about their general election preferences. Half were asked

about four potential Republican-Democratic presidential election match-ups (Clinton versus McCain, Clinton versus Giuliani, Obama versus McCain, and Obama versus Giuliani), while the other half were asked about four other potential match-ups (Clinton versus Romney, Clinton versus Thompson, Obama versus Romney, and Obama versus Thompson).

Survey results show that Governor Ed Rendell’s job performance ratings remain similar to his June performance; half (47%) of respondents rate his job performance as excellent or good, and half (51%) say he is doing only a fair or poor job. At the moment, Senator Arlen Specter enjoys higher job performance ratings than Senator Bob Casey (51% and 42% excellent or good rating, respectively). George Bush’s job performance ratings have hit an all-time low; only 23 percent of respondents believe he is doing an excellent or good job as president.

The state legislature continues to be viewed negatively by residents of the State--only 26 percent say the legislature is doing an excellent or a good job,

while 69 percent say it's doing only a fair or a poor job. When asked who should decide legislative pay hikes, a majority (61%) of respondents believe the voters themselves should decide, while one third feel (31%) a special commission of citizens should do so.

Survey respondents were more likely to blame the legislature (56%) than the Governor (27%) for the delay in passing the state budget. Yet, respondents say they trust the legislature (48%) more than the Governor (39%) when it comes to making decisions about the state budget.

This fall, the state legislature might consider banning smoking in restaurants and bars. Pennsylvanians are divided over a public ban in restaurants and bars--53 percent think banning smoking in restaurants and bars should be left to individual business owners, while 46 percent believe the State should impose such a ban.

The legislature might also consider changing the date of next year's presidential primary election, currently scheduled for the third Tuesday in April. Only 35 percent of respondents strongly or somewhat favor moving the date earlier in the year, while 56 percent are somewhat or strongly opposed to the change.

Finally, in 2005, Justice Russell Nigro, largely as a result of the controversy over the legislative and judicial pay hike, was denied retention to another ten year term on the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. This fall, Justice Tom Saylor stands for a similar retention vote to serve another 10 years on the Court. When asked how they would vote on Saylor's retention, almost half (46%) of

those interviewed are undecided, one in four (21%) say they would vote to remove him, and 18 percent indicate they would vote for him to serve another term.
